8. What do we call all the ships together that carry cargo or passengers?

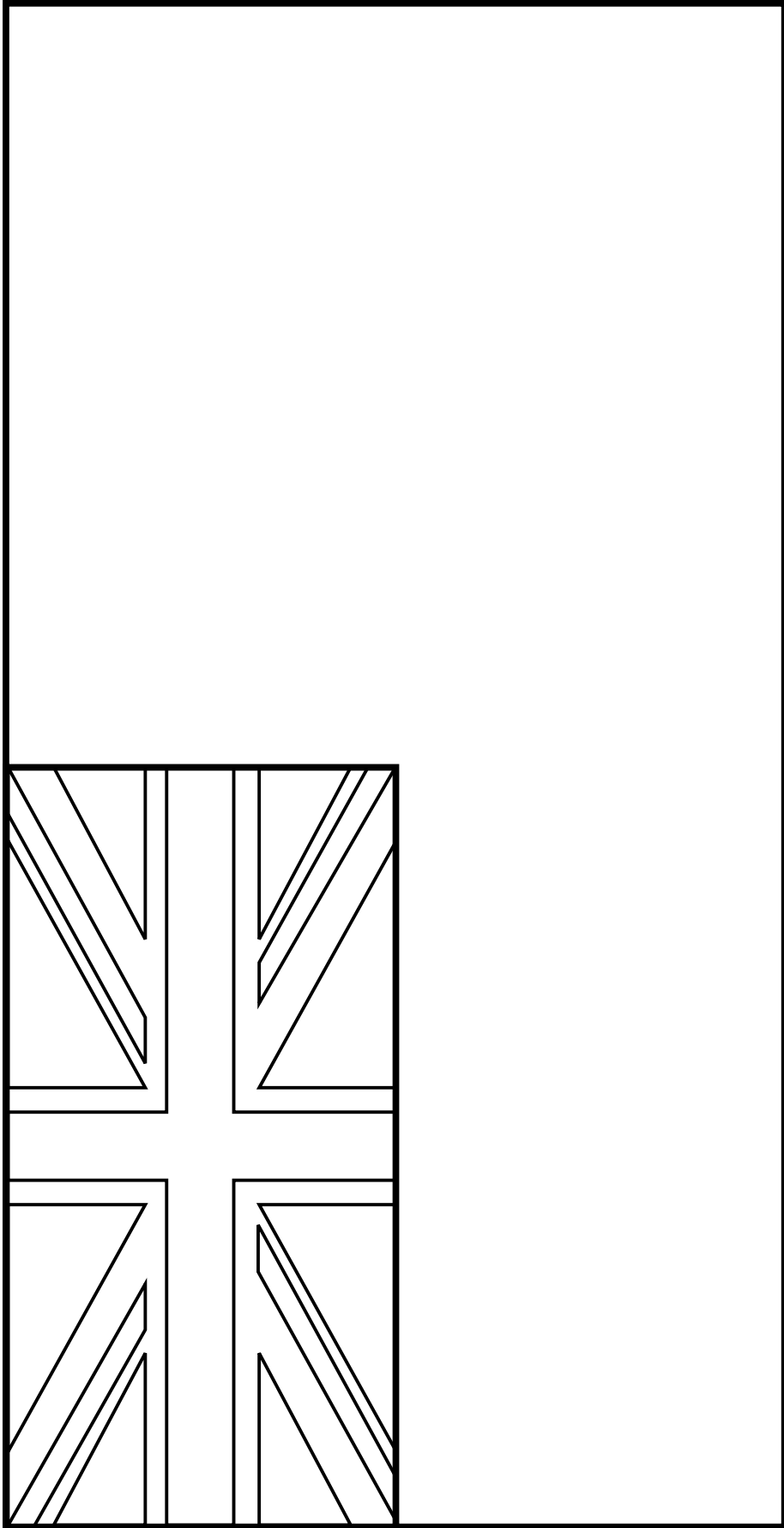
9. What is the name of the special flag that cargo and passenger ships fly?

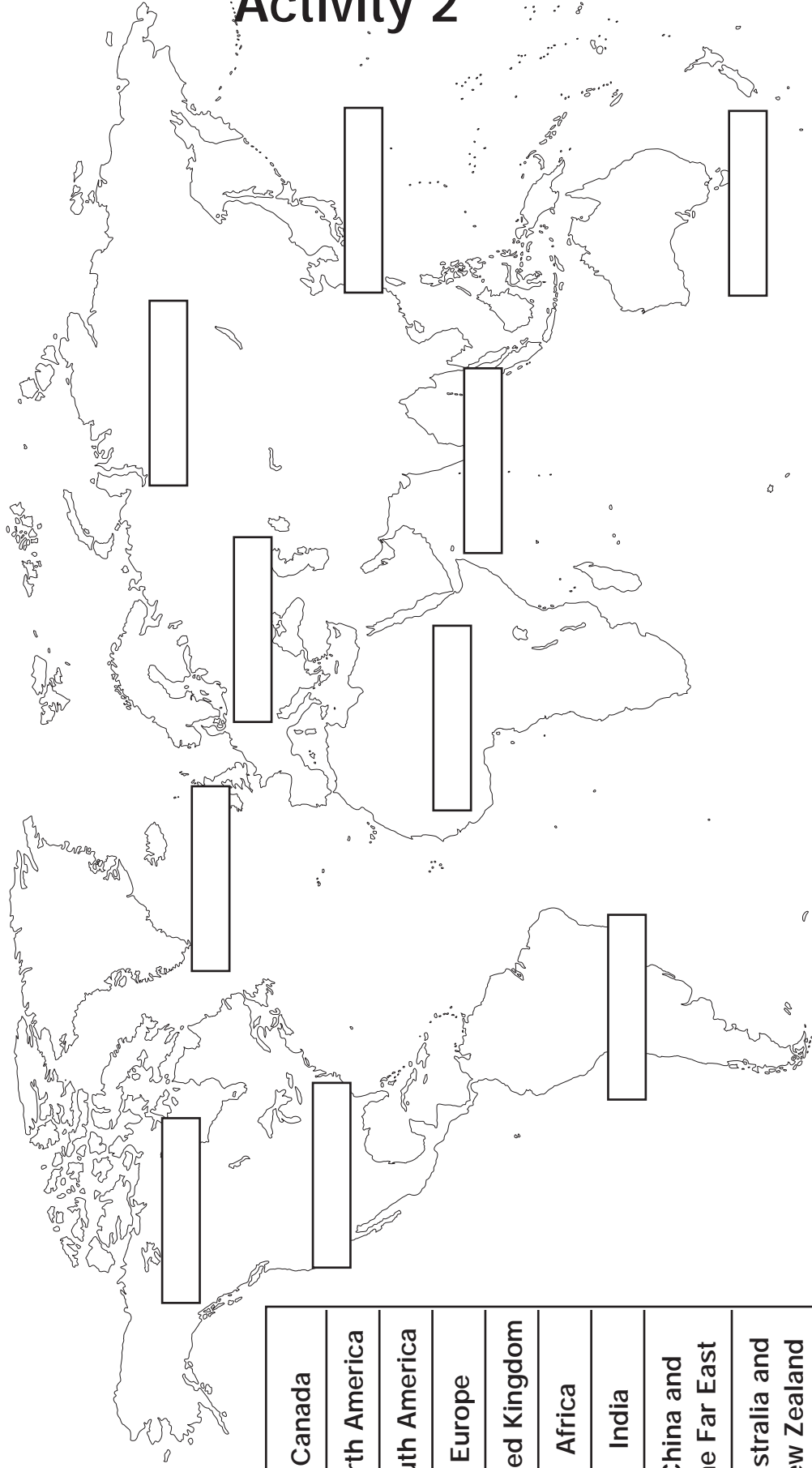
